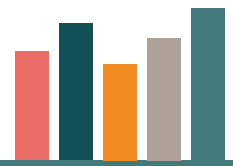

Letter from MNCM President and CEO Julie Sonier

I recently came across an interesting *report* on racial disparities in depression treatment by the Blue Cross Blue Shield Association. Published in May 2022, I found this report noteworthy for several reasons.

First, it directly addresses two topics that have been much in the news and the focus of attention from health care stakeholders of all types in the last couple of years: mental health, and racial disparities in health and health care. Both topics have taken on increased urgency considering the COVID-19 pandemic and the increased attention to racial disparities and racial justice since the murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis in May 2020.

Second, several of the findings are quite striking. The analysis suggests that major depression is likely significantly underdiagnosed in Black and Hispanic communities, especially in communities where there were fewer behavioral health care providers. Among those who do receive a diagnosis, the analysis showed disparities in treatment of depression, for both prescription drug treatment and counseling.

Third, there are substantial data limitations and hurdles that must be overcome to better understand and act on disparities. For this analysis, race/ethnicity was estimated based on the majority race/ethnicity among households by zip code. Given the data limitations and the urgent need for improved understanding of disparities, this approach represents a creative solution – but it is far from perfect and highlights the urgent need for better information if we are to make progress in improving health equity.

Though not directly comparable to the data analyzed in the Blue Cross Blue Shield Association study, the data on depression outcomes collected by MNCM also show disparities by race and ethnicity, as well as language and country of origin (RELC). In May, we published our annual *report on disparities in quality metrics by RELC* using data collected in 2021 (largely reflecting 2020 dates of service). Among adults diagnosed with depression, rates of remission at six months for Black, Hispanic/Latinx, and Indigenous Minnesotans were well below the statewide average (at 59 percent, 72 percent, and 73 percent of the statewide average, respectively).

MNCM is frequently sought out as a national leader in the collection of high-quality, comprehensive data on RELC that we use to understand disparities in care and health outcomes. We are proud of the collective work of our entire community to get to this point but know that there is so much more that needs to be done – related to improving the availability and reliability of data, but also in how data are leveraged to drive knowledge and action.

Given MNCM's focus on data to drive improvement, we are interested in hearing your stories about using the data for improvement in health and health equity. Opportunity for Public Comment: New Measures for Obesity Management

Starting in late summer, MNMCM will update its release schedule for the reports it publishes. This new cadence of releases will improve timeliness – with reports released closer to the dates of service reflected in the measures.

This change will split the Health Care Quality Report into three parts. Part 1 will be released in late summer with a focus on measures calculated from clinical data submitted to MNMCM. Part 2 will be released in early winter with a focus on HEDIS measures. Part 3 will be released at the beginning of the year and will highlight the top performers from the previous year.

This report, summarizes quality measures for patients enrolled in Minnesota Health Care Programs (MHCP) and makes comparisons by insurance type. It focuses on the managed care components of Minnesota's Medical Assistance and MinnesotaCare programs. As enrollment in these programs continues to increase, this report helps the state and health care providers identify opportunities to improve the health care and health outcomes for people served by state programs. Leveraging Data to Understand and Address Disparities in Vascular and Diabetes Care – Preparedness and Treatment Equity Coalition (PTEC) Project Report

This report analyzes and shows disparities in vascular care and diabetes care in Minnesota for Black, Hispanic/Latinx, Asian, and Native American communities, including detailed demographic and geographic analysis within each of these groups. Using the results of the data analysis, the report develops and prioritizes action strategies that can be used by health care stakeholders to close gaps in care and reduce disparities.

Health Inequities in Optimal Diabetes Care and Optimal Vascular Care Measures

Chronic conditions such as diabetes and vascular disease have disproportionate impacts on people who are Black, Hispanic/Latinx, Asian, and Native American. This is due to higher prevalence of disease and a lower likelihood that these conditions are managed optimally to result in better outcomes. Better understanding the reasons for these disparities in health outcomes is essential to developing health care delivery and payment strategies that will reduce these known disparities.

This webinar provided an overview of the results of a grant-funded project to leverage the data that MNMCM collects to better understand and address disparities in diabetes and vascular care, and to use the data to develop strategies to reduce disparities. The webinar included key findings from the analysis as well as the strategies identified by a community advisory group.
